Follow the steps below *before* your immigrant visa interview at the U.S. Embassy in Asunción, Paraguay.

Step 1: Register your appointment online

You need to register your appointment online and include information for everyone who is applying with you. Registering your appointment provides us with the information we need to deliver your passport(s) to you after your interview. Failure to register will result in additional delays and possibly expenses. Registration is free. Click the “Register” button below to register.

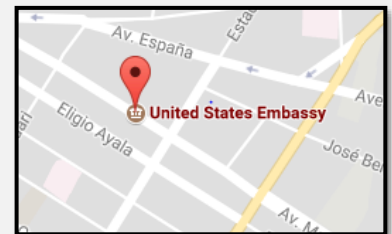

Medical Exam Instructions



Everyone applying for an immigrant visa, no matter how old they are, must have a medical exam before they can get their visa. Only a physician approved by the U.S. Embassy is allowed to do this exam. **It is your responsibility to schedule a medical exam with one of the doctors listed below *before* your visa appointment** at the U.S. Embassy. Medical exam results from other physicians will **not** be accepted.

Items to bring to your medical examination

Bring the following items to your medical exam:

- Your visa interview letter,
- Your valid passport,
- Four (4) recently taken passport-sized color photographs, and
- A copy of your immunization records.
- DS-260 confirmation page.

You must pay all medical exam fees, including x-ray and blood test fees, directly to the examining physician.

During the medical exam

The medical examination will include a medical history review, physical examination, and chest X-ray, gonorrhea test, and blood test (for applicants 15 years of age or older). The United States also requires tuberculosis (TB) testing for all applicants two years of age and older. Please be prepared to discuss your medical history, medications you are taking, and current treatments you are undergoing. U.S. immigration law requires immigrant visa applicants to obtain certain vaccinations prior to the issuance of a visa. Current immigrant visa vaccination requirements are available [CDC.Gov](#). 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Medical Exam Instructions



After the medical exam

When your examination is completed, the doctor will either provide you with exam results in a sealed envelope or send them directly to the U.S. Embassy.

IF GIVEN AN ENVELOPE TO CARRY TO YOUR INTERVIEW, **DO NOT OPEN THIS ENVELOPE**. Instead, bring it to your visa interview.

Any x-rays taken will be given to you along with a copy of your vaccination documentation worksheet. You **DO NOT** need to bring the x-rays or vaccine information to your visa interview unless you suffer from tuberculosis (TB). However, you **must** carry both the x-rays and your vaccine documentation with you when you travel to the United States for the first time. The medical report must be less than six (6) months old when you enter the United States as an immigrant.

Use the list below to determine the items that every applicant must bring to the immigrant visa interview.

Any documents that are not in English or Spanish must be accompanied by a certified English translation:

- ☐ A copy of your NVC interview letter (does not apply to Diversity Visa, fiancé(e), adoptive, or asylee/refugee applicants).
- ☐ Unexpired passport valid for six (6) months beyond your intended date of entry to the United States and a photocopy of the biographic page (where your name and photo are located).
- ☐ Two (2) color photographs on a white background of each person applying for a visa (5 cm x 5 cm, or 2 inch x 2 inch). Please review our [online photo requirements](#) and suggested [studios in Asunción](#).
- ☐ Confirmation page from the Form DS-260 Application for an Immigrant Visa you submitted online at ceac.state.gov/iv.
- ☐ Your original birth certificate, English translation, and a photocopy.
- ☐ Original or certified copies of birth certificates for all children of the principal applicant (*even if he or she is not accompanying*).
- ☐ Medical examination results in a sealed envelope (*if the physician gives you these results*).

Applicants who fall into any category listed in italics below should bring these additional documents:

For family-based visa applications:

- ☐ The appropriate [Form I-864 Affidavit of Support](#) for **each** financial sponsor along with a photocopy of the sponsor's IRS transcript or most recent U.S. federal income tax return, and any relevant W-2s. There are other variations of the Affidavit of Support. Please fill out the one that applies to your case best.
- ☐ Proof of your U.S. petitioner's status and [domicile](#) in the United States (photocopy of a U.S. passport, naturalization certificate, or lawful permanent resident card).
- ☐ Evidence of the relationship between the petitioner and visa applicant (such as photographs, letters, or emails).

If you are married:

- ☐ Your original marriage certificate and a photocopy.

If you were previously married:

- ☐ Your original divorce or spouse's death certificate, and a photocopy.

If you are older than 16 years of age:

- ☐ The original police certificate from your country of current residence and countries you've previously resided for at least 6 months. If these three items are *all* true, you must bring a more recent police certificate to the interview:
 1. You are older than 16 years;
 2. You obtained a police certificate and submitted it to NVC more than two years ago; and
 3. You still live in the country that issued the police certificate.

For employment-based visa applications:

- ☐ Letter from your U.S. employer dated less than one month ago.

If you have ever been convicted of a crime:

- ☐ Court and criminal records, and a photocopy.

If you have served in any country's military:

- ☐ Military records and a photocopy.

If you are adopted:

- ☐ Adoption papers or custody documents, and a photocopy.

If you are the petitioner's stepchild:

- ☐ The original marriage certificate of the petitioner and your biological parent, and a photocopy along with divorce records for any previous marriages of either parent

Interview Guidelines



Sending documents to the U.S. Embassy

If the U.S. Embassy needs additional information or documents from you, the consular officer will provide instructions on how to submit those to the embassy.

Rescheduling or cancelling your interview

If you are unable to attend your appointment, visit ais.usvisa-info.com to select a new appointment date. If not available, contact paraguayIV@state.gov to request a new appointment.

There may be a significant wait before the next available appointment, so attempt to attend the date already assigned.

There's no guarantee that a visa will still be available if you reschedule your appointment. Check the [Visa Bulletin](#) carefully before you reschedule your interview. If you're applying for a Diversity Visa (DV), remember that visas are limited in number and must be issued by September 30 of the program year.

Security screening procedures

Everyone visiting the U.S. Embassy must follow security rules. If you refuse to go through security screening, you won't be allowed to enter. To avoid delays for yourself and others, only bring what you need for your appointment.

Accompanying people

Attorneys are **not** permitted to accompany clients into the waiting room or to their interview. Only the following persons may accompany a visa applicant to their interview:

- Interpreter: Applicants may bring ONE interpreter if they do not speak English or Spanish well enough to participate in an interview.
- Special Needs Visitors: Applicants may bring ONE person to help if they are elderly, disabled, or a minor child.

Immigrant visa fees

If you have not paid all required fees to the National Visa Center or via the appointment website, you must pay on the day of your interview. All fees may be paid in either U.S. dollars or Guaranies. We accept cash and credit cards only. *If you are found ineligible to receive a visa, the application fee cannot be refunded.* A complete list of fees is [here](#).

Do not make travel plans outside of Paraguay

If your visa is approved, we will keep your passport at the embassy while we prepare your immigration packet and print your visa. We will return your passport to you later via courier services only (see [Step 1](#)). If you must travel within Paraguay while your passport is still with us, please make sure you have a valid picture ID other than your passport.

After Your Visa Interview



A consular officer can only decide on a visa application after reviewing the formal application and interviewing the applicant. **There is no guarantee that you will receive a visa.** Do not sell your house, car or property, resign from your job or make non-refundable flight or other travel arrangements until you have received your immigrant visa.

If more information is needed

Sometimes a consular officer refuses a visa application to review *additional documents* or for *administrative processing*.

For additional documents:

- The consular officer will give you a refusal letter that asks you to submit additional documents.
- The letter will include instructions on how to submit those documents to the embassy.

For administrative processing:

- This means the consulate needs more time to review your case.
- The amount of time this takes depends on your specific situation.

Wait **at least** 60 days after your interview before asking about your application status.

What happens after visa approval

Passport, Visa, and Sealed Immigrant Packet – We will place your immigrant visa on a page in your passport. Please review your visa to make sure there are no spelling errors. If your case **is** electronic, you will not receive a sealed envelope. If your case is **not** electronic, we will also give you a sealed envelope containing documents that you must give to U.S. immigration authorities when you arrive in the United States for the first time. **Do not open this envelope. You must carry it with you. Do not put it in your checked luggage.** If you receive X-rays during your medical examination, carry those with you and give them to the U.S. immigration authorities, if required.

USCIS Immigrant Fee – All individuals who are issued immigrant visas overseas must **pay an [Immigrant Fee](#)** to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) **prior to traveling** to the United States. This fee is for processing your residency status and printing your Permanent Resident Card. The only people exempt from paying this fee are: children entering the United States under the Hague Process, returning residents, and people traveling on fiancé (e) (K) visa.

When You Should Travel – You must enter the United States *before* the expiration date on your visa, which is usually the same as the expiration date on your medical evaluation. Your visa cannot be extended and all fees are nonrefundable. The principal applicant must enter **before or at the same time** as other family members with visas. Unless they are eligible for benefits under the Child Status Protection Act, children who are issued a visa before turning 21 years of age must enter the United States **before** their 21st birthday to avoid losing their immigrant status.

Getting a Green Card – Your Form I-551 Permanent Resident Card, also known as a green card, will be automatically mailed to the address in the United States that you write in your visa application form. This very important document that proves you have permission to reside in the United States. *If you plan to travel outside the U.S. before your green card arrives:* Please consult [USCIS's](#) and [CBP's](#) websites for rules about what documents you need to re-enter the country. We also recommend you check with the airline to ensure you are in compliance with their rules. *Once your card is issued, you should not stay outside of the United States for more than one year. If you do, you will lose your status as a Lawful Permanent Resident.*

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After Your Visa Interview



Children's Issues – In the United States, children are required to have certain vaccinations before they can enroll in school. We recommend that you bring your child's complete vaccination records with you to the United States. If your child is adopted, you have full custody because of a divorce, or you share custody with another parent, you should bring a copy of all applicable adoption or custodial papers from the authoritative court in your home country. You will need these papers (translated into English) for issues such as school enrollment, medical care, and eventual citizenship.

Diversity Visa Applicants – Additional Information



If you are interviewing for a Diversity Visa (DV), all of the above instructions apply to you. Please schedule and attend a [medical examination](#) prior to your visa interview; enroll in the required [courier service](#); and gather the required documents.

Below are additional instructions that apply only to DV applicants.

Bring to your interview

In addition to the documents listed on the [Pre-Interview Checklist](#) in this package, DV applicants should also bring the following items to your visa interview:

- ☐ Appointment information printed from the “Entrant Status Check” on the [E-DV website](#).
- ☐ Documents showing that you have either a qualifying high school education **OR** two (2) years of qualifying work experience in the five (5) years immediately prior to application (for the principal applicant only; more information is available [online](#)).
- ☐ Payment in cash of the \$330 Diversity Visa Application Fee for each applicant.

Review your Diversity Visa entry

Prior to your visa interview, we recommend that you review the data on your initial E-DV entry. On your initial E-DV application, you must have correctly entered your marital status. If you are legally married you must have listed your spouse, even if you are currently separated from him/her (unless your spouse is a U.S. citizen or Lawful Permanent Resident).

Additionally, you must have listed ALL of your living children who are unmarried and under 21 years old. This includes your natural children, your spouse’s children, or children you have formally adopted in accordance with the laws of your country.

Failure to have listed an existing spouse or children at the time of your entry in the Diversity Visa lottery will result in the denial of your visa and visas for your family.

Any fees paid to the U.S. government in support of your visa application(s) are nonrefundable. If you failed to include a child who had already been born, or a spouse to whom you were married when you entered the lottery, you should not proceed with the visa application.
